Comments will be limited to three (3) minutes per person, with a maximum of 15 minutes for all items. In practicality, this means no more than five individuals will be allowed to comment verbally. There is no limit on written public comments.
 - b. Public Comments on Action Items: Public Comments will be allowed on each action item on the Committee agenda. Verbal comments will be allowed on action items after staff has given their report and have allowed time for initial Committee questions. Comments will be limited to three (3) minutes per person, with a maximum of 15 minutes for all comments on each action item. In practicality, this means no more than five (5) individuals will be allowed to comment verbally. There is no limit on written public comments.

Dear Public Arts Committee members,

I'm excited to see you this Monday, November 25, 2024, for our regular monthly meeting at 4 p.m. at Florence City Hall. We will be meeting in the City Council Chambers, either in person or through the GoToWebinar platform. As a reminder, our December meeting will be held at 5:30 p.m. to allow for community involvement.

The meeting will begin with public comment. However, due to our heavy workload during the meeting, we are skipping our Continuing Education presentation. Staff will next present the proposed 2025 Public Arts Committee Calendar; this will be dependent on the Florence City Council approving their calendar on November 18.

The majority of the meeting will be to talk about Art Exposed Old Town 2025-2027, https://bit.ly/FlorenceArtExposed. Our Call for Art on Call for Entry (CaFÉ) concluded on Friday, November 8. We received 25 submissions for the eight locations in Historic Old Town Florence. Members of the Art Exposed Subcommittee met twice in November to get acquainted with the submissions and review the location descriptions in the Call for Art.

I attended the November 18, 2025 City Council Meeting and was very excited to hear that both Dina Pavlis and Committee Member Steve Ball commented on the wonderful new Rhododendron Drive project. And I was also excited to hear both of them suggest some sort of amazing artwork for the huge canvas aka retaining wall. I know there are many options and hoops to jump through to get some sort of city mural project underway, so I just want to suggest (again) considering an Audubon bird inspired mural. I know it takes a village to make something like this happen and there are many creative options to consider.

Steve also suggested some sculptures possibly? Several years back when the remodel of the new Transfer Station finally finished, Kelly Bell, Lane County Waste Management Master Recycler Coordinator, had some wonderful ideas about putting a Washed Ashore (recycled plastic) sculpture at the entrance to the new site. Location Information

Location #1 – Veterans Memorial Park

This location is at the City of Florence's Veterans Memorial Park alongside the Siuslaw River. The park provides an opportunity for the public to view the piece during special veteran and community events, as well as every day. The piece will be close to lodging and foot traffic in town and the location overlooks the picturesque Siuslaw River Bridge. *The art chosen for this location will be given preference to an American military veteran, or art that honors American veterans.* The base at this location is approximately 2 feet tall.

Maximum Dimension Requirements:

Height: No more than 8 feet tall Width: Cannot exceed 5 feet wide

Location #2 – River Roasters

This location is on the west end of Bay Street, the main street of Old Town commerce. The base for this location is located approximately 2 feet west of the end of the River Roasters coffee shop patio, near native landscaping and seasonal flowers. This is a high-traffic location in a busy part of Old Town, where people walk to restaurants and shops. This spot is a vista point for the Siuslaw River Bridge, visible from the installation spot at the local Rain Garden and Interpretive Site.

Maximum Dimension Requirements:

Height: No more than 4 feet tall Width: Cannot exceed 3 feet at the base

<u>Location #3 – Rain Garden</u>

This show-stopping location is set in the middle of the Rain Garden between Bay Street and the Siuslaw River. The art pedestal has been built into the native landscaping to be the same height as the nearby walkway. This allows the selected art to frame the historic, art deco Siuslaw River Bridge in the background and work with the natural colors of the seasonal Rain Garden. This location is near both Location #2 and #4, and a walkway and sidewalk connects them all.

Maximum Dimension Requirements:

Height: No more than 10 feet tall Width: Cannot exceed 5 feet at the base

Location #4 – Interpretive Center East

Location #4 is on the eastern side of the Siuslaw River Interpretive Center. This space is in front of pine trees and near the City of Florence's holiday tree, which is decorated each December. Two walkways frame this installation area, which has nearly 360-degree visibility. Nearby trees are trimmed to expose art at this location. Many people walk past this location every day to view the Siuslaw River Bridge or visit popular neighboring restaurants and shops in the Old Town District.

Maximum Dimension Requirements:

Height: No more than 7 feet tall Width: Cannot exceed 3 feet at the base

<u>Location #5 – Gazebo Park Plaza</u>

Gazebo Park, also known as Old Town Park, offers views of both the City's vintage white gazebo and the Siuslaw River. This art location is at the entrance to Gazebo Park near brickwork and behind a railing in front of trees and native shrubbery. This work is mainly seen from the front of the shaded plaza area. Visitors often take time to sit on the benches located right under this piece. It is located in the middle of the highly trafficked main street in Old Town.

Maximum Dimension Requirements:

Height: No more than 7 feet tall Width: Cannot exceed 3 feet at the base

Location #6 – Secret Garden

Tucked into the native landscaping inside Gazebo Park, this location is in a raised planter bed along a brick pathway. This leads to the gazebo and a deck overlooking both the Siuslaw River Bridge and a historic ferry landing. The selected work will be framed by two different walkways that intersect, allowing views from both the front and the back of the art. The installation area is mostly shaded and contains shrubs and native rhododendrons alongside an open, grassy area and a slate paver pathway.

Maximum Dimension Requirements:

Height: No more than 4 feet tall Width: Cannot exceed 3 feet at the base

Location #7 – Maple Street Park

This location is at the entrance of Old Town's Maple Street Park, which contains local restrooms and access to the Port of Siuslaw's crabbing and fishing docks. This high-traffic area, right along the sidewalk of Bay Street, is at a busy intersection where people access restaurants, shops, and the local Florence Farmers Market. This paved mini park has benches, a maple tree that branches over the park area, and trees and rhododendrons that provide a colorful, seasonal backdrop for the many visitors.

Maximum Dimension Requirements:

Height: No more than 6 feet tall Width: Cannot exceed 3 feet at the base

<u>Location #8 – Florence Area Chamber of Commerce Lawn Entrance</u>

In the grassy lawn of the Florence Area Chamber of Commerce's Visitor Center on Maple Street, this location welcomes visitors to the Old Town District. It is also near the City of Florence's recently completed multi-million-dollar streetscape project that expanded sidewalks, repaved the highway, and increased walkability. This location is near the entrance to a public parking lot and the busy Visitor Center. Just north of the placement of this work is the Maple Street Plaza, another Art Exposed location.

Maximum Dimension Requirements:

Height: No more than 10 feet tall Width: Cannot exceed 3 feet at the base



Artist A — Sharon Agnor "Genesis"



Artist Statement:

As an artist It's important to me to have my work be part of the visual conversation art creates in our public and private spaces. My desire is to create meaningful, thoughtful work that tells a story. Exploring the effects of life's unpredictable events, the healing impact of the natural beauty around me, and the resulting decision I make moving forward motivate me in my work. What causes us to move from hardship toward optimism is a subject that I personally think about. These themes tend to find expression in my work.

I have been working with Stainless Steel and glass for over 20 years. I have been participating in Rotating Outdoor Galleries for 15 years. My sculptures employ stainless steel, copper, bronze, and kiln worked glass. I enjoy the undeniable parallel between real life and the process these materials undergo as they are subjected to extreme heat, to be transformed into something full of beauty.

Artist B — Ann Cavanaugh "Musing Arcs"



Artist Statement:

Cavanaugh Fused Glass is a mother/daughter team that focuses on artwork inspired by nature. We create statements out of glass that celebrate flora and fauna. Our pieces are designed to exist out in the environment. We've chosen glass as our medium because of the way light transforms it and for its durability. The glass we make reflects the textures and colors of the natural world. Not only valued as a utilitarian material, glass is now celebrated as a contemporary fine art, encompassing superior qualities of clarity, transparency, and luminescence.

Ann Cavanaugh grew up roaming and "making" in the outdoors of Oregon. Early exposure to formal art instruction and lots of room for experimentation has culminated in being a maker of glass for 47 years. Her work can be seen in galleries and private residencies as well as in public spaces such as libraries, hospitals and parks.

Megan Andrews was raised in much the same free roaming way as my mom. She received formal art training in San Francisco. She came back to the Pacific Northwest with family in tow to passionately dive into glass making side by side with her mom. She has implemented a "no waste/reduced footprint" policy and standard for all their projects and classes. Much of her work embodies utilizing recycled studio materials. One of her recent large-scale projects was a large fence commission created out of recycled studio glass.

Art Title: "Musing Arcs"

Date Created: 2023-2024

Description: Half circle standing sculptures capturing thoughtful moments.

Medium: Repurposed glass on edge is fused into a panel, which are further embellished and fused again. Once final design is achieved, they are draped and fused over a metal form. They are then cold worked and finished, then fitted to a metal base.

Date Created: 2023-2024

Description: Story Poles are four sided weather treated posts with fused glass panels attached. Each one tells the tale of our relationship with nature. These poles can include solar lighting or bird houses as toppers.

This sculpture incorporates two types of movement. This first is the visual movement of the different sizes of rectangles leading the viewer to move visually from one section to the sculpture to the next. The second part is the actual movement of the center pieces within each rectangle. Feel free to give them a spin. As you move along from this piece I hope you leave with an extra hop in your step!

Medium: This piece uses reclaimed metal to create the form. I welded the 2"x2" steel tubes together as well as the 1/4" steel rods in the centers. The metal base, created with1/8" sheets, is reinforced with angle iron running horizontally underneath to add stability to the sculpture. I have added metal tabs to the base with holes in the tabs for ease of installation (either by welding the tabs to the city provided base or by bolting down to the base). This piece has been coated with a clear protective coating to prepare it to withstand the elements.

I enjoy designing and creating art (mainly sculpture) that will be viewed by the public. Description: This piece was designed by me on a computer. The vector image was sent to a shop that is able to cut the aluminum with a waterjet process. After the pieces have been cut, I grind them with a 24 grit disk and fabricate them by doing "plug" welds. The welds are done so they can be ground off on the surface therefore are not visible. The 24 grit grinding grit offers a coarse line pattern that reflects light in a unique way. This piece is also extremely vandal resistant. Paint and other markings can be ground off with a 24 grit disk grinder.

Artist I — Diego Harris "Steel Sprig"



Artist Statement:

My name is Diego Harris and I'm an artist living and working in Upper Lake California. My primary focus is on creating larger than life Corten steel sculptures with abstract shapes that almost border on figurative plant and animal themes. My piece for this entry is titled Steel Sprig. Steel Sprig is a very curvaceous but slender Corten steel sculpture with an internal structure of steel rebar. I wanted it to have a very alive feeling to it and also that it would seem to be growing out of the ground like a large tropical plant of some kind. As it appears in the photos I'm submitting, it's very shiny and new, but over time it will develop a fine red rust patina.

I've made about 40 large scale Corten steel sculptures. I've made dozens more in mild steel and scrap metals as well as many gates and benches and such. I've been welding large sculptures for about 15 years now. I have many sculptures in sculpture shows in several states as well as many on permanent display.

Art Title: "Steel Sprig"

Date Created: 2024

Description: Large abstract Corten steel sculpture with an internal structure of steel rebar. There are four 3/16 inch thick by 2 inch wide Corten steel loops with 5/8th

inch holes for bolting down the sculpture. They are located at points roughly centered with the sides of the base of the sculpture. They are about 24 inches apart. The sculpture can also be welded down if it's easier.

Medium: 16 gauge Corten steel sheeting and 8 gauge Corten steel plate as well as an internal structure of 3/8th inch steel rebar. I start by constructing an internal structure of steel rebar. I bend the rebar to form the outlines of the sculpture and then weld cross members to add strength. Once I have the structure done I trace out the curves with packing paper and then transfer the shapes to the Corten sheet steel. I cut out the sheet steel with a plasma cutter and then sand all the edges smooth. I bend all the sheets by hand and then clamp them onto the structure of the sculpture before seam welding all the edges. The last thing I do is sand all the welds smooth for safety and aesthetics.

I've had ten years employment casting bronze at Riverdog Fine Arts, 2 more years at Walla Walla Foundry, Molding, making waxes and welding and chasing bronzes for clients and myself, plus fabricating in steel and stainless steel 34 years.

Art Title: "The Old Rooster"

Date Created: 2001

Description: "The Old Rooster" reminds me of an art work my father hung in our home of Georges Roualt's "The Old King." The King/Rooster is worn and tired from his duties but still in charge. It is in its way a tribute to my father (don't get me wrongpapa was faithful to my mother). I sculpted this work out of plaster over a steel armature, using a cheese grater for the surface texture, before molding and casting it into bronze. It is well traveled having been in numerous juried one and two year outdoor exhibitions, chosen by Bruce Guenther, curator of the Portland Art Museum, for a show in Colorado Springs.


Artist Statement:
